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In the brand new field of medical marijuana law, Pittsburgh firm sees plenty of potential work

- The shingle went up just a few weeks ago: a three-attorney Downtown firm, Cannabis Legal Solutions, LLC, has formed the first local practice specializing in medical marijuana law — but it likely won't be the last.
- With Pennsylvania's medical marijuana program preparing for launch next year, the legal profession is already getting in position "to help shape a burgeoning industry in Pennsylvania" as the Pennsylvania Bar Association phrased it when forming a medical marijuana and hemp law committee



Burgeoning or not, a new law firm specializing in legal marijuana matters may look like a risky venture to the unlitigated eye.

Pennsylvania's medical marijuana program is still months from starting and state officials have so far issued only 12 grower-processor permits and 26 medical marijuana dispensary permits for the entire state.

That's not exactly a large client base to draw from.

But the three Cannabis Legal Solutions partners - Patrick Nightingale, Andrew Gross and Alan Patterson - see real potential for this new area of law, even with competing medical marijuana firms in Philadelphia and Harrisburg.

Medical marijuana patient evaluation center opens in Pittsburgh

A national medical marijuana network opened an office in Pittsburgh this week to help eligible patients with evaluations and certifications for cannabis treatment.

Compassionate Certification Centers announced Friday its office opened on Stanwix Street in Gateway Center.

Dr. Bryan Doner and Dr. Keyur Patel of Compassionate Certification Centers will oversee the office to provide "medical cannabis evaluations, guidance through the certification process and continued treatment care for eligible patients who have been diagnosed with one of 17 state qualifying conditions."

"We want to set a new benchmark in medical cannabis care. Our physicians and health care providers come from a variety of sub-specialties and are certified by their respective state," Doner said in a news release. "We are more than just certification centers, and we are proud to offer patients ongoing care and support based on their individual needs."

Compassionate Certification Centers plans to open 25 patient centers throughout Pennsylvania. Its officials said that about 200,000 state residents are able to qualify for medical marijuana cards. By Friday, the new Pittsburgh office had already booked 93 patients. No referral is necessary, officials said.



A week after a medical marijuana conference brought former football players to Pittsburgh to advocate the benefits of cannabis use in controlling pain, NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell proclaimed on a sports talk show that the drug is addictive and unhealthy for players.

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"It does have an addictive nature," Goodell said Friday on the ESPN show "Mike & Mike." "There are a lot of compounds in marijuana that may not be healthy for the players long term. All of those things have to be considered. And it's not as simple as someone just wants to feel better after a game. We really want to help our players in that circumstance, but I want to make sure that the negative consequences aren't something that is something that we'll be held accountable for some years down the road."

Last weekend's World Medical Cannabis Conference and Expo at Downtown's David L. Lawrence Convention Center brought the likes of former Heisman Trophy winner and former NFL running back Ricky Williams to push pro-pot agendas.

While NFL players are allowed to take heavy prescription drugs, such as opioids, for pain, marijuana remains a banned substance.

"If you get in the drug program and you get in trouble, it's so punitive," Williams told the Tribune-Review while discussing NFL drug policies. "Players aren't getting help. They are only getting punished for something that I think we can at least make the argument is probably healthier than opioids and prescription drugs that players are taking."



Hemp to be grown in experiment at I-70 Industrial Park

A medical cannabis company will utilize a 5-acre site on the I-70 Industrial Park grounds in South Huntingdon Township for a hemp farming experiment that could create a new source of jobs in Westmoreland County.

"Our farmers desperately need a new crop that is commercially viable and offers a more stable volume," said Matthew Mallory, founder of Commonwealth Alternative Medicinal Options LLC of Pittsburgh, also known as CAMO.

Earlier this month, the Westmoreland County commissioners, serving as the board of directors of the Westmoreland County Industrial Development Corp., approved a short-term land lease agreement with CAMO for the site behind the Target Drilling site along Glacier Drive.

WCIDC Executive Director Jason Rigone touted the agreement as "an opportunity to put unused land at the I-70 Industrial Park to use by supporting research and development for a potential new industry."

CAMO will begin raising hemp this year in an area accessible by foot or four-wheel drive vehicle. It is not far from a Wendell H. Stone Co. facility and the Dick's Sporting Goods distribution center

PITTSBURGH >> It's been a year since Gov. Tom Wolf signed the bill making medical marijuana legal in Pennsylvania planting the seeds of capitalism in a new industry. Medical Cannabis Expo: Practice Runs Ahead of Science

— With legal barriers holding up research, patients aren't waiting for randomized trials

PITTSBURGH -- Professional football players know pain, but some say they want a way out of team-based regimens of pills and injections they say leave them feeling angry and debilitated. The way out? Medical marijuana, the focus of the first-ever World Medical Cannabis Conference & Expo -- a conference that started, fittingly, the day following the traditional April 20 "pot holiday."

As medical conferences go, it was highly atypical. Science was not at the forefront; not many American investigators feel comfortable investigating a substance that is Schedule 1 illegal, by federal law. Also, the conference was supported by a unique group of exhibitors, more than 80, ranging from marijuana growers to dispensaries to specialized laboratories to manufacturers of cannabis delivery systems, including sublingual tabs, vape pens, and edibles (with featured guest Laurie Wolf, dubbed the "Martha Stewart" of edibles).



The social momentum favoring medical marijuana is undeniable. Currently 28 (soon to be 36) states have legalized medical marijuana for conditions such as chronic pain, seizure disorders, and traumatic brain injury, and these states are busily creating safe and effective treatment networks to support its use. All this momentum culminated in the pioneering conference founded by Pittsburgh's Compassionate Certification Centers for medical marijuana administration and its CEO, Bryan Doner,

DO.

Whatever the conference lacked in science it made up for with compelling stories.

The stories, for example, of those professional football players looking to avoid the pain pill mills they see foisted upon them by teams trying to keep them on the field. Of mothers of profoundly ill children wanting relief from major side effects of standard treatments. Of sufferers from chronic pain who have been ostracized from receiving any standard treatment whatever after being discovered having experimented with cannabis

Eben Britton, former offensive lineman for the Jacksonville Jaguars and Chicago Bears, said, "I received painkillers like Ativan, Celebrex and toradol injections before and after the game for various injuries throughout my career, and guys like me are finding these are wreaking havoc with their bodies, physically and mentally. For me, juxtaposing the use of opiates, which made me angry, irritable, and suffering withdrawal symptoms, against the use of cannabis showed me a much more healing experience. I could cope with the stress and anxiety of being isolated with injury and was able to feel both emotionally and spiritually rejuvenated, and ready to grind it out again."

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


In 2004, Ricky Williams retired from the NFL for the first time after failing his third NFL-mandated drug test in five seasons.



The two state senators who championed medical marijuana in Pennsylvania are hopeful the program will be up and running by Valentine's Day 2018.

That's when Sen. Daylin Leach believes the first patients will be able to get cannabis from the state's yet-to-open dispensaries, he said Friday afternoon at a medical marijuana conference in Pittsburgh. Leach and Sen. Mike Folmer emphasized that there's no firm timeline, as growers and processors will still have to, well, grow and process cannabis after they receive licenses.

Pennsylvania Gov. Tom Wolf signed the state's medical marijuana bill into law on April 17 of last year. It allows physicians who undergo four hours of training to prescribe cannabis to patients with 17 conditions including pain. The Department of Health will issue up to 27 permits for dispensaries during the first phase of rollout, meaning 150 dispensaries will be able to operate statewide in different zones. The state will also issue up to 12 permits for growers and processors initially. Applications closed at the end of March, and the state should award licenses at the end of June, the senators said.

Competition for those licenses is fierce. When asked about ensuring diversity in the industry, Leach said applicants can gain points for being a minority or woman, for example. But both Leach and Folmer stressed that there's no special way to obtain one. Even Wolf has a best friend who is applying, Leach said, but the governor can't — and won't — do anything to help.

Even though the medical program isn't up and running yet, Friday's conversation turned to what's next — namely, recreational pot.

Folmer, a Republican from Central Pa., said he's not against legalization, but added that he can't be at the front of this issue because of the promises he had to make to his caucus to get



Professional and retired mainstream athletes are already using forms of cannabis and cannabidiol (CBD) for acute and long-term pain management. So are extreme athletes, who are known to have high rates of impact injuries, ready for some alternative medicine

According to a recent study in the Orthopaedic Journal of Sports Medicine, the four extreme sports with the highest incidences of head and neck injuries are skateboarding, snowboarding, skiing and motocross. The study also showed that snowboarders face the highest risk of concussion, with a risk per hour of riding that's triple that of skiers.

Bufalini doesn't need a license because her store, the first Pennsylvania franchise of Colorado-based Nature's Best CBD, isn't considered a medical marijuana business.

Janea Cox, her husband Brian, their 7-year-old daughter Haleigh and their chocolate Lab Kala left their Forsyth home in December 2016 for their semi-annual trip to Colorado. They flew into Denver and made their way toward Colorado Springs in a rental car, squeezing the three of them, a wheelchair and the dog into the small, four-door sedan. A handicap-equipped van would have been better, but the economy ride was what they could afford.

The family checked into a budget hotel and went to sleep; not that they ever sleep well, or for very long. Young Haleigh was up through the night, as usual. She has epilepsy so severe she requires constant oversight. For most of her life, her young brain hasn't been seizure-free long enough to develop normally. So she gets around in a wheelchair, receives nourishment through a feeding tube and is barely able to communicate. Haleigh is a prisoner in her own body.

She also has type one diabetes. Kala is a service dog specially trained to check blood sugar levels by smell and alert handlers of spikes — to do what Haleigh cannot do for herself, to speak out when she needs help.

These family trips are not fun. They stretch the Coxes to their financial limit. And they take everything Janea and Brian have just to get to the offices of the Flowering Hope Foundation, where botanist Jason Cranford dispenses his specially formulated cannabis oil, Haleigh's Hope, named after his special client. Janea believes it is the only thing that has kept her daughter alive.

The cannabis oil isn't the only thing named after Janea and Brian's daughter. Her

In April of last year, Governor Wolf signed into law Pennsylvania's medical cannabis legislation.

Pennsylvanians suffering from numerous illnesses including cancer, HIV/AIDS, epilepsy, and Parkinson's Disease are qualified to obtain medical marijuana in the form of pills, oils and creams - but not in plant form.

A patient must be certified by a physician and issued a patient ID card. Government assistance and private health insurers are not required to reimburse patients for medical marijuana costs.

Last month, the Pennsylvania Health Department released applications for growers and dispensers. Permit approvals will be announced this June.





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

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



More than half of the adult population in the U.S. now has access to legal cannabis, and it is estimated that more than 500,000 patients may potentially benefit from medical marijuana treatments. 
Though the recreational market garners a lot of the spotlight, the medical side of the industry has been a critical component of the entire industry's evolution, and will continue to do so in the future. Recent research from New Frontier has projected that the U.S. medical marijuana market will reach \$11 billion in 2020. Further estimates reveal that states like Ohio, Michigan, and Pennsylvania, are going to be key players in the industry.

Florida's market alone is expected to reach \$1.6 billion by 2020, making it half the size of California's projected \$2.6 billion market and above Colorado's projected \$1.5 billion medical marijuana market. From a research and clinical integration standpoint, we have only scratched the surface of medical cannabis as an entity. It very well may be one of the most important developments in the history of modern medicine, and time will tell. Its importance to the acceptance, integration and expansion of the cannabis industry cannot be underestimated.

These numbers are astounding and yet what is even more astounding is the lack of resources available to healthcare providers, who are a critical cog in the wheel. Medical marijuana is applicable to anyone who is involved in patient care, yet until recently, resources have been difficult to find and only initiated on a small scale. As a physician and medical marijuana advocate, I have noticed that despite the overwhelming amount of directories and educational platforms for patients, there is a surprisingly small amount of resources for those on the other end of the spectrum - physicians, nurses, clinicians, etc.

For the legal cannabis industry to progress and move forward we need to educate providers and work towards integrating medical marijuana into mainstream medicine. Now that 28 states have passed legalization measures, it is imperative that all physicians and providers have a baseline understanding of the endocannabinoid system and medical marijuana. Not only of the science, but also how the system in our country works, which differs stateby-state and is far from traditional. They also, like patients, need to be provided with the

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Shifting a Paradigm: Is Cannabis Study Worthy of Academia?

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With ample scientific proof that medical marijuana is not just a viable medical treatment, but also necessary for maintaining optimal health, it's astonishing that so many higher education institutions have yet to recognize the legitimacy or value of cannabis study. More than 30 years ago, scientists discovered that cannabis unlocks the functionality of a vital internal system known as the endo-cannabinoid system, which governs immune and neurological responses in the human body. Since then, only a handful of medical schools have added courses on the endo-cannabinoid system in their doctoral syllabus. Fewer still have yet to sanction or allocate funding or resources for cannabis study and academic research at their institutions.

Ironically, federal law remains one of the biggest barriers deterring academic research, but federal law won't change until more cannabis study is conducted in academic and clinical settings. Federal law also bars physicians from "prescribing" medical marijuana, which could explain why doctors seldom advocate for marijuana or go out of their way to learn more about it. Greater acceptance in the academic world is more likely if medical professionals take the lead. Their advocacy we the positive stigma associated with marijuana, which is another deterrent having universities from pushing for permits to conduct clinical





In February, NFL commissioner Roger Goodell was asked during the week of Super Bowl 50 about the league's marijuana policy. Across the country, states were legalizing marijuana use in increasing numbers, and former NFL players were increasingly pushing for the league to reconsider marijuana's potential to relieve the chronic pain inherent with such a brutal game.

But, in spite of those societal changes and the pleas of former players, the commissioner maintained the party line. The league's drug policy, he said, was still in "the best interest of our players." When asked in November for an update on the league's stance, an NFL spokesperson had little to add.

Goodell did acknowledge that day that the league was aware of scientific developments in marijuana research. But for the NFL's medical experts, it wasn't enough. Until those experts change their view, "I don't expect we will change ours," he said.
